Dear <<First Name>>,

The beginning of the year is a good time to reflect upon just how far we have come in addressing men's use of domestic and family violence. A time to regroup from the year just gone and plan for the one to come.

For me this was particularly important considering 2024 was a year of unprecedented focus on men's use of family violence and tragically, far too many deaths and still too many women and children living in fear.



I want to acknowledge the tireless work of the sector over the year and particularly over what should be the festive season. We know this is a time when family violence is more prevalent making this one of the busiest and most difficult times of year for many of us working in the sector.

Here at NTV, our Men's Referral Service was as busy as ever as it operated day and night across the festive period. As the national 'front door' for men seeking to change their behaviour, we have been busy linking men to specialist men's behaviour changes programs and the broader community service including parenting programs, AOD programs, health supports and accommodation services.

In addition, NTV has been supporting our members and the broader service system by working

Victoria.

I want to thank our team here at NTV, as well as all of our members working across the country, for your ongoing dedication and commitment in addressing men's use of family violence.

Looking ahead to 2025, going on what we have already seen this year our collective work to end men's use of family violence will be more critical than ever. NTV will continue to be at the table with governments and policy makers across the country, advocating on behalf of our members and our sector for the radical change we need to really address the crisis of men's use of violence in Australia.

I'm optimistic about continuing our advocacy successes following constructive meetings across December and January with the Prime Minister's Office, the Federal Assistant Minister for the Prevention of Family Violence, Justine Elliot, the Shadow Federal Minister for Prevention of Family Violence, Senator Kerrynne Liddle and the office of the Shadow Federal Assistant Minister for Prevention of Family Violence Pat Conaghan MP.

Across Australia, we've had productive meetings with new Victorian Minister for Family Violence Prevention Natalie Hutchins and continuing support from the NSW Minister Jodi Harrison, as well as key NSW Greens Member of the Legislative Council Abigail Boyd.

We are really excited by the commencement of work in NSW on developing that state's first dedicated strategy for people using domestic and family violence and NTV is part of the Reference Group guiding the development of the strategy. NSW's commitment to a Person Using Violence strategy is a direct result of NTV's state-based advocacy on behalf of members and has been supported by the rollout of new Men's Behaviour Change Programs in NSW with \$10 million of funding secured also as a result of NTV's advocacy.

We believe we are seeing a growing understanding of the key role of men in stopping domestic and family violence and a growing appetite from governments for embracing innovative and more sophisticated ways of understanding men's use of violence.

Closer to home, here at NTV over the coming weeks and months we will be creating our new Strategic Plan. We will be consulting with our members and other key stakeholders to hear their views on NTV's role in practice leadership and workforce development as well as our sector advocacy, policy and research objectives.

It's so important that we hear direct from the source where our sector is headed, how we can most effectively make an impact and what NTV does well and where we can continue to develop to ensure we maximise our impact in ending men's use of family violence.

Workforce Capability Project: mapping the education, training and employment pathways in our sector

NTV has joined with the Centre for Workforce Excellence (CWE) in the Department of Families, Fairness and Housing (DFFH) Victoria to map the education, training and employment pathways for people who work in interventions with people using family violence (PUV). This project will be led by NTV's Dr Jessica Seamer who has a background in researching interventions for PUVs within Victoria and working in the vocational and higher education space.

This project is particularly interested in identifying and advancing new, innovative options that will help to build workforce capacity and capability and grow the effectiveness of such a specialised workforce. Engagement with key stakeholders across the family violence, mental health, alcohol and other drugs, justice services, education and training sectors will take place to inform the key recommendations of this project.

Ultimately, the project aims to build sector, organisational and workforce development and capability; support recruitment and retention of this specialist workforce, strengthen leadership within this specialist sector and – critically – prioritise employee health, safety and wellbeing. Best Practice Supervision - videos and discussion guides now available in Victoria

Supervision is an important part of working in the family violence, sexual assault and child wellbeing sectors. It helps every employee get the support, knowledge and confidence they need to deliver quality services to clients.

To support organisations across these sectors in Victoria to deliver regular and effective supervision to employees, the Victorian Government has launched the Best Practice Supervision Guidelines.

In the lead up to the festive season NTV collaborated with valued partner Our Watch on a national campaign to raise awareness of the increase in prevalence of DFV during the festive season, focusing on the risk factors of AOD (and to a lesser extent gambling) at that time of year and encouraging people to reach out to support services including MRS for support.

Our CEO Phillip Ripper was interviewed on ABC NewsRadio Breakfast and quoted in this story in AAP and the Canberra Times.

We also collaborated in Victoria with Victoria Police and Safe Steps on a pre-festive season media campaign leading to Phillip being interviewed by <u>ABC The World Today</u>.

Phillip was also interviewed on WIN News and SBS News – with the <u>SBS news</u> story published on Christmas Day.

In early January NTV did rounds in the media responding to revelations about Victoria Police investigating an alarming number of its own members for dangerous and inappropriate conduct including family violence. This led to prominent coverage on Nine News and ABC News national PM program.

Phillip suggested that the figures being reported were only the tip of the iceberg. Family violence in the general community is grossly under reported, and potentially even more so in the police force.

YSAS Introduction to working with Adolescents & Young Men using Intimate Partner Violence

No to Violence has partnered with the Youth Support Advocacy Service (YSAS) to co-develop and deliver our much-anticipated new workshop Introduction to working with Adolescents and Young Men using Intimate Partner Violence.

This 7-hour training will examine the dynamics and impacts of Adolescent and Youth Intimate Partner Violence (AYIPV), as well as the importance of youth-focused interventions. Upon completion of this training, participants will be equipped with the knowledge and skills to engage effectively and sensitively with adolescents and young men using IPV, while considering developmentally appropriate approaches and opportunities for interventions and change.

The training is suitable for practitioners who, in the course of their work, come into contact with adolescents and young men using IPV (e.g., specialist family violence practitioners, youth workers, child protection workers, etc.,) or students considering a career in working with adolescents and young people.


NSWMBC Network meeting
